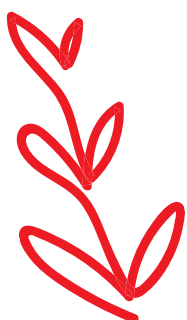

2nd Transnational Project Meeting in Lithuania 🇱🇹

On **September 25–26, 2025**, the ACCESS partners met in **Joniškis, Lithuania**, hosted by *Joniškis "Saulės" Basic School*. The meeting marked an important milestone in the project's implementation, providing a valuable opportunity for collaboration, discussion, and reflection on the progress achieved so far.

During the two-day meeting, partners:

- Reviewed the implementation progress and upcoming deliverables.
- Finalised the **asynchronous e-learning course** for primary school teachers.
- Discussed the design and structure of the **digital library** and **parent toolkit**.
- Shared updates on **dissemination activities** and performance indicators.
- Planned the organisation of **Open Events** across all partner countries this November.

Each partner presented their respective Work Packages (WPs), sharing updates, insights, and next steps to ensure smooth coordination of project activities.

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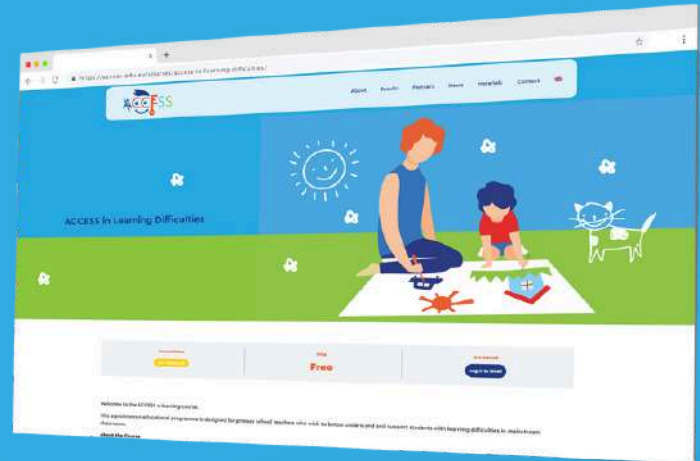
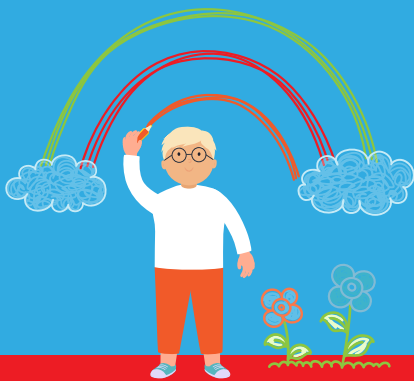
E-learning Course for Primary School Teachers

The **ACCESS e-learning course** is now complete and entering its final phase of translation into all partner languages. Once the translations are ready, the **piloting phase** will begin, allowing teachers to explore the platform, test its functionality, and provide valuable feedback.

This self-paced training programme is designed to **empower primary school teachers** to identify and manage learning difficulties effectively within mainstream classrooms.

Each chapter combines theory, practical guidance, and reflection activities. Participants must achieve **at least 80%** on each quiz to progress and receive a **Certificate of Participation** upon successful completion.

It will soon be available on the project's website.

The first promotional video of the ACCESS project has been officially released and is now available on the project's website and YouTube channel.

The video presents the project's mission, goals, and main results, including the e-learning course, the digital library, and the parent toolkit — all designed to promote inclusive education in Europe. These events will highlight the project's tools and achievements so far, with a particular focus on early intervention, collaboration between teachers and families, and the importance of inclusion in mainstream education.

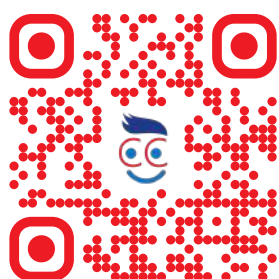
